About vocational education and training (VET)



Vocational education and training (VET) is skills training students can do for certain types of jobs.

Students can do VET as part of Year 11 and 12.



A VET course can make it easier for some people to find work as soon as they finish Year 12.




Students can study a VET course at:

their school

or

• a training organisation – like a TAFE.



Students can add a VET course to their studies in Year 11 and 12.



Some schools might let students start a VET course in Year 10.

VCAA is an organisation that makes sure students in Victoria:

- learn the right things
- take tests that show what they know.

What students can do with a VET course



Students can do a VET course as part of their Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE).



The VCE is a certificate students can get if they:

- go to high school in Victoria
 and
- finish Year 11 and 12.



A VET course is also an important part of the **VCE Vocational Major**.

Students can learn in the VCE Vocational Major program for 2 years.



It gives students the skills and experience they might need after they finish Year 12 to:

- get work
- keep studying.





Students must do a VET course as part of their VCE Vocational Major.



A VET course can also be a part of doing the Victorian Pathways Certificate (VPC).

The VPC is a certificate students can study during Year 11 and 12 in Victoria.



Students can do the VPC if their school thinks it's the right course for them.



Some VET courses can also count toward a student's **Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR)**.



An ATAR is a number that scores a student against other students who studied in the same state.

An ATAR can be between 0 and 99.95.



How students can make money while they study



Some VET courses can include a **traineeship** or apprenticeship.

A traineeship or apprenticeship is when students learn how to do a job while they are at work.



This can let students:

- learn while they work
- work with professionals
- make money while they learn.



We call these 'school-based apprenticeships and traineeships' (SBAT).



Many students who do an SBAT stay on in their job as a full-time worker after they finish school.

There are many VET courses students can study.



Students can check with their school's careers counsellor to find out what VET courses they can do.



A careers counsellor is someone who gives students advice about:

- their future jobs
- the skills they will need.

Health



VET courses about health can help students get ready to work in some healthcare jobs.







An ATAR can be between 0 and 99.95.




Careers counsellor
